

Dennis Carter: 1935 - 2023

Birds are a miracle because they prove to us there is a finer, simpler state of being which we may strive to attain.

~Douglas Coupland

Perhaps the description of being kind and gentle isn't always enough to make a person famous, but Dennis Carter was indeed famous for being just that: a kind, gentle, and true friend to both people and birds. Dennis passed in May of 2023 at the age of 88 years. The details of his life show his love of nature and his commitment to the land.

I loved the story of him joining the Iowa Ornithologists Union as a junior member at just twelve years of age and remaining a lifelong member. In the same year, his detailed field notes of a nest of a Loggerhead Shrike were published in the September 1947 issue of Iowa Bird Life.

Dennis attended Iowa State University where he earned an M.S. degree in Wildlife Management. His ability and enthusiasm for educating people about birds led to a park naturalist position working for the National Park Service in Zion National Park, Utah, in 1962. He later transferred to Arches National Park, Utah, and still later to Blue Ridge Parkway. In 1975 he was promoted to head naturalist at Shenandoah National Park in Virginia. He finished out his professional career supervising nature interpreters for parks in Pennsylvania and New Jersey at Delaware Water Gap.

Dennis retired and moved to Decorah in 1990 and we were lucky to have him as a reliable board member of Upper Iowa Audubon for over 25 years. He often led bird tours at Effigy Mounds National Monument and at Cardinal Marsh. During these years he recorded a remarkable 258 bird species in Winneshiek County.

Dennis was thorough in his record keeping and his attention to detail. When I submitted reports and proposals to Upper Iowa Audubon, I realized that Dennis read through them carefully and he often had helpful comments. A few years before his death, Paul Skrade and I visited Dennis at the Wellington Place; while his balance was a little shaky, his mind was clear and he had acute interest and valuable comments on projects that Paul and I were working on. We will remember Dennis for his life-long diligence to birds and the way he connected people to the birds he loved.
