Hummingbirds

Learn the interesting aspects of hummingbird biology and behavior. As well as how to welcome these fascinating birds to your feeders.

Christmas Bird Count The Audubon Christmas Bird Count had its 124th count in mid-December through early January.

This nation-wide count is the longest-running citizen science program in the world and has provided researchers and birders with an amazing data set of information on birds.

Bridgeport Count, December 15

Weather: Mild Species Count: 63 *Notable observations:* Northern species such as finches, Redpolls, Siskins, Horned Larks, and Longspurs were conspicuously absent. Nearly absent this year were Robins and Waxwings, likely due to the lack of berries.

Decorah Count, December 16th.

Weather: Foggy and Misty, Rain Species County: 45 *Notable observations:* Similar to Bridgeport count; especially low numbers of northern finches and robins.

Yellow River Count, December 20.

Weather: Unreported Species Count: 52

Notable Observations: Again, northern finches and other northern species were not found in large numbers; notably, Red-breasted Nuthatches were nearly absent. Open water on the creeks and Mississippi River had larger numbers of waterfowl compared with other years.

Participation in Christmas Bird Counts is open to anyone interested in joining in the fun. Any level of birding skill is acceptable.

Please watch for announcements of counts next winter and consider joining one or more of the counts.
